Each year, over 31,000 children, youth, and adults participate in our programs in more than 160 communities throughout the country.



Our Mission and Our Work

Frontier College is a national charitable literacy organization. We believe literacy is a right. We work with volunteers and community partners to support people in gaining the skills and confidence they need to reach their potential and fully contribute to society.

In order to achieve our mission, we are committed to finding and using innovative ways to reach the people who need us most. Our activities, programs, and services are free and inclusive of any individual for whom our assistance is welcome and needed.

Some examples of our adaptable work include:

- ✓ Basic math, literacy, and exam preparation for adults and youth pursuing careers in trades
- ✓ Workplace literacy and essential skills for employees
- ✓ Literacy and life skills for adults with disabilities
- ✓ Academic upgrading (General Educational Development®) and computer skills training for street-involved and at-risk youth

- ✓ Literacy training for inmates in institutions
- ✓ Reading and homework support for children and youth in a variety of settings
- ✓ English/French as an additional language (EAL/FAL)
- ✓ Support for newcomers to Canada and temporary foreign workers
- ✓ Intergenerational programs for families
- ✓ Literacy- and learning-based conferences
- ✓ Parent and caregiver workshops



Across Canada, we also run Summer Literacy Camps for children and youth in over 125 Indigenous communities. These camps involve a variety of hands-on, interactive literacy games; storytelling; arts and crafts; drama; music; and cultural activities to create a fun and engaging experience for young people (5-16 years of age). We work with communities to develop camps that best suit the needs of their children and youth.

Through our web-based Virtual Learning Portal and extensive, online library of tutoring resources, adult learners and trained tutors located anywhere can work together in real time to address individual learning goals.





Our History

Since 1899, Frontier College has been reaching out to people in their communities and responding to their learning needs.

Concerned about the lack of access to education for many immigrant labourers in remote locations on the Canadian frontier, Frontier College founder, Alfred Fitzpatrick, set up Reading Tents that displayed one simple message: READING TENT—ALL WELCOME. These mobile libraries presented learning opportunities within the workplace, and established that every place is a learning place. It was here that Fitzpatrick first envisioned Labourer-Teachers, a group of young, university-educated volunteers who worked with the labourers by day and taught them by night, thereby pioneering how education and basic literacy was taught throughout Canada.

Since then, we have grown to serve over 31,000 people annually in most provinces and territories, with learner-centred programming in libraries, health centres, public housing sites, prisons, shelters, and schools.

We have nearly **500 community partners** throughout the country. Based on a third party survey, 89% stated that the contribution of Frontier College brought a strong and definite impact to their organization.

In 2017, we received The Canadian Teachers' **Federation Public Education Advocacy Award** for "longstanding contribution to public education in our country." And in 2018, we received the **Ontario Teachers' Federation's Greer Award** in recognition of "outstanding contributions" to publicly funded education in Ontario."



We are honoured to receive such acknowledgement of our work.

Frontier College recently embarked on an in-depth strategic planning process. We consulted volunteers, staff, partners, learners, parents, teachers, and supporters to determine opportunities for growth and barriers to success.

Our research revealed that Frontier College is well respected—we are seen as excellent partners who produce good results and use resources wisely; our work is appreciated and valued. But we learned that more needs to be done, and the first thing we need to do is get people talking about the issue. By finding new ways to share our story—highlighting the value of literacy and the evidence of our impact—we will attract new resources to support our efforts to help people in Canada enjoy the many positive benefits of literacy.

MEETING NEW MILESTONES THROUGH LITERACY

Melanie, a young woman in her 30s, had many gifts and abilities to share but she needed help to complete her high school diploma so she could find a new job and get off social assistance.

"My support worker suggested that I attend school and focus on getting a career. I moved from program to program until I arrived at Frontier College's *Beat the Street* program," Melanie says.

Melanie arrived at Frontier College uncertain of her future and not knowing what to expect from Frontier College. She spent eight months in intensive study with our volunteer tutors working on English and Math, with the hopes of attaining her General Education Development (GED®)—a high school equivalency certificate—and enrolling in a trades program in college. In between sessions with her tutor, Melanie also participated in Frontier College's social enterprise, Frontier College Books, where she developed strong employment and leadership skills.

Despite her best efforts, Melanie had a setback when she wrote her exam the first time—she passed in all areas, except for Math. Not to be deterred, Melanie returned to her studies and focused on mathematics. On her second try, she passed and earned her diploma. She is now an apprentice plumber and continues to work hard to have the life she wants
