parents, Elders and community members took part in camps to lead in activities, share cultural knowledge and their expertise; this is approximately 111% more than in 2014.



Summer Literacy Camps combats summer learning loss, cultivate a love of reading, and promote parental and community involvement in children's learning.

Literacy and numeracy are embedded in various camp activities, and in 2015, campers spent an average of 51 minutes reading each day.

More than 37,000 new, high-quality books were distributed at the end of camps in 2015.
